CMS Issues New Affiliation Fraud Rules for Providers



Recently, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) issued a final rule giving the agency more authority to prevent fraud. With the new rule, CMS can reject a provider's or supplier's enrollment in Medicare, Medicaid or Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) if they are affiliated with businesses that have had their enrollments revoked due to fraud, abuse or waste.

Finalizing this rule has been a long drawn-out process, as it was first proposed in 2016. CMS cites provider burden concerns voiced during the proposed rule's comment period as one of the reasons for the delay.

PECOS Update Brings Enhancements – But Is Not Completely Implemented





PECOS, the Provider Enrollment and Chain/Ownership System, implemented Release 7.37 on June 30, 2019. The scheduled release will help bring efficiencies to Medicare Administrative Contractors (MACs) and those providers



who use PECOS.

PECOS is an electronic portal for physician Medicare enrollment. Through this system, providers can:

- Submit and track Medicare enrollment applications
- Update enrollment .
- View and print enrollment information ٠
- Complete revalidation
- · Voluntarily withdraw from Medicare

Thrilling Thanksgiving Trivia



Although the first American Thanksgiving was in 1621, the earliest record for the word "thanksgiving" goes back to the 1530s. English speakers used it at that time to express gratitude for good fortune, for example for a safe journey.

There are many myths and fantasies about our first Thanksgiving celebration. When you gather around your table for this year's holiday, wow your family and friends with these amazing Thanksgiving trivia facts:

- The first Thanksgiving celebration lasted for 3 days! Far longer than today's holiday which is about as long as 2 football games.
- There were about 50 European settlers and 90 Native Americans in attendance.
- The first Thanksgiving feast was "potluck" with the Wampanoag bringing food to share with the colonists. At the meal venison, ham, waterfowl, lobster, clams, berries, pumpkin, fruit and squash were enjoyed.
- Although many Americans celebrated Thanksgiving sporadically beginning in 1774, in 1863 President Abraham

Lincoln proclaimed a day of Thanksgiving to be the last Thursday of November.

- In 1939 President Franklin Roosevelt changed the holiday to the fourth Thursday in November. That year, there were 5 Thursdays in November and retailers begged him to move the holiday up to give more time for holiday shopping.
- Pumpkin pies as we know them today began appearing in American cookbooks in the eighteenth century but had been enjoyed in England a hundred years earlier.
- Canada celebrates its own Thanksgiving a month earlier than the U.S., but only one spot in Australia has this holiday. The custom was brought to Norfolk Island, east of Australia, by American whaling ships.
- 46 million turkeys are eaten on Thanksgiving Day in the U.S.!



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
